Barack Obama's website ([barackobama.com](http://barackobama.com)) states that Senator Obama and Senator Frank Lautenberg (D-NJ) introduced legislation that would regulate "chemical facilities to enhance security, including improving barriers, containment, mitigation, and safety training, and where possible, using safer technology such as less toxic chemicals." The new president must keep our borders secure, our citizens safe as they travel, and must protect potential targets from terrorist attacks.

The second area the next president must concentrate on is diplomacy with other countries. The next administration needs to meet with our allies to enlist their support in the War Against Terror

globally. Our allies should be concerned about preventing nuclear threats from Iran and North Korea, hunting down al Qaeda in Afghanistan and Pakistan, China's oppression of Taiwan, and Russia's attack on Georgia. President George W. Bush used diplomacy to encourage Russia to sign a cease-fire agreement with Georgia on August 16, 2008. The new president should also use diplomacy as an alternative to military force when other countries take threatening actions against our allies. Barack Obama stated in 2007 that he would be willing to meet with some of America's biggest enemies, including Iran's president Mahmoud Ahmadinejad. (Whitelaw 36) John McCain responded to this by saying, "It's hard to see what such a summit with President Ahmadinejad would actually gain, except an earful of anti-Semitic rants." (Whitelaw 36) Obama replied, "It is time to once again make American diplomacy a tool to succeed, not just a means of containing failure." (Whitelaw 36)

When diplomacy fails, however, the United States needs to rely on its military to protect Americans at home and abroad. The next president must insure that our military is fully funded so our troops have proper equipment, monetary compensation, medical benefits,
